Long- Time Resident Clint Self Interviewed: In April Clint Self & his wife Nancy sat down with Linda Allen Kappel and Judy Abood for an interview, as part of the Society's ongoing effort to gather information about Cornville's history from long-time residents and descendants of early settlers. Clint came to the Verde Valley in 1930 from Liberty, Arizona (between Phoenix & Buckeye) when he was one year old. Since then, he has lived in Camp Verde, Clarkdale, Cottonwood and Cornville--with a few breaks when he went to Texas, served in Korea, moved to Colorado for awhile and worked in Flagstaff for a few years. He now lives in Page Springs with Nancy, who is the daughter of one of Cornville's early settlers, Rev. Jacob Frey. Clint has story after story to tell about his life in the Valley. He worked in the mines at Jerome, helped build the first power lines, was a farmer and rancher, managed a Ford garage, ran all kinds of heavy equipment, drove a propane truck, owned a service station, worked for Yavapai County and the City of Cottonwood; and he's a cowboy poet! The interview transcript is now part of the Society's Oral History files and will serve as reference for further research. For more information or to arrange an interview, call any Board member.
