## **Page Springs Historic Markers Dedicated**


On May 3, the Society hosted a dedication of historic markers honoring the James Page Homestead and the Page Springs Store & Gas Station. Yavapai County Supervisor Tom Thurman was guest speaker and unveiled the markers with help from Fayth Black, a sixth generation member of the Page family. Twenty members of the Page Family, including Fanita Page, Jack Page and Joe Birch, and many children and grandchildren, attended the ceremony at Up the Creek Grill on Page Springs Road.

One marker is now installed at the south parking lot of the Page Springs Fish Hatchery, near the site of the last surviving structure from the Page homestead. The other is placed at the entrance of Up the Creek Grill, which was the original site of the Page Springs Store and Gas Station, established in the 1950's by Jim and Fanita Page.

The Cornville Historical Society has now placed a total of four markers, in cooperation with private property owners. In 2012, the first two were placed at sites of the old Cornville Post Office on Cornville Road. Over time, the Society hopes to place a series of markers at key historic sites.

## **Old Post Office Changing Face**

The old Cornville Post Office & Store has undergone a major change in appearance during the past couple months, with construction of the porch and façade well underway. Volunteer work crew members have completed repairs of board and batten siding on the sides and back, the front façade requires extensive work to install flashing and add reinforcement.

The photos above left and center show (1) how the structure appears from Cornville Road and (2) a view of the back of the façade, which illustrates the reinforcement work that is being done. The above right photo shows the wooded setting of the structure, as it appears from the rear in Windmill Gardens.

Next steps in the work include reconstruction of door and window frames, completion of the porch roof, and exterior finish. Then, interpretive features will be designed and installed that can be viewed from the porch through the front windows. A pathway of commemorative bricks is envisioned leading to the porch, where wooden crates and barrels will be displayed as in the historic photo.

# Society Seeking Grant Funds

In March, the Society applied for a Yavapai Community Foundation Grant for the Old Post Office Restoration Project. If approved, the funds will be used primarily to design and develop the exhibit phase of the project. Grants will be awarded in June 2014. When reconstruction of the historic landmark is complete, exhibits will be placed inside to be viewed through the windows from the porch. Some display items have already been collected and others will be needed to make the structure appear as it did between 1909 and 1914.
