In Memoriam

Alice Selch Stephenson was born on September 12, 1941 in Steamboat Springs, Colorado. Alice died on December 18, 2017

at her home in Oak Creek Valley surrounded by her loved ones, including her husband, John. Alice was a Registered Nurse, who never stopped caring for other people. She was an active volunteer and an avid outdoorswoman. She only recently completed a rafting trip down the Colorado



River. She was an author, having published two books (<u>Three Scuffed Suitcases</u> and <u>Letters to My Children</u>). In 2011, Alice assisted the Cornville Historical Society when she researched and completed the application process for the Arizona Women's Heritage Trail, nominating the first woman settler in Cornville, Margaret Jackson Dumas. Although the nomination was denied, we were grateful for all the time and effort Alice put forth in this endeavor. We will miss her smiling face and strong support at all our events.

Mary Swain Huffaker was born August 16, 1921 near Junction City, Oregon, and died on December 31, 2017 in Yukon,



Oklahoma. A long-time resident of Arizona, Mary graduated from Prescott High School. Mary was a WAVES veteran of WWII. Mary married William L. Huffaker in 1946. For more than 30 years, the couple owned a farm in Cornville, from which they 1st sold chickens

(fryers), more than 5,000 every 2 weeks at one point, and then they switched to hens, selling the eggs from more than 4,000 chickens. Many people growing up in Cornville remember working for the Huffakers. They sold the business in 1979 but continued to live in Cornville. William died in 1992; Mary moved to Cottonwood in 1997. After more than 50 years in Cornville, Mary was always supportive of the efforts of the Cornville Historical Society. Anytime a question arose, we would email Mary for help. She also donated numerous newspaper articles and clippings from her vast collection. Her assistance and wealth of knowledge will be sorely missed.

We remember and honor these ladies contributions to Cornville history.




Road Petitions filed with Yavapai County

Mike Spencer from Prescott recently contacted us to share some documents he has obtained and is collecting related to early road documents filed with the County. These primarily consist of petitions to create roads and or to appoint road overseers. These show original signatures on the petitions and many of our early settlers in Cornville signed these. Shown below are excerpts from 3 of these petitions, showing the signature of Henry Mortimer Cone, for whom Cornville was to be named:

From the Michael Spencer Collection:


From August 24, 1884:

The story of Cornville is that it was supposed to be named Coneville for Henry Mortimer Cone. You be the judge: Could these signatures, and one like it, possibly be read as Corn, for Cornville, and misread on an application.
