GRANT RECEIVED FOR OLD POST OFFICE

In January, the Society was awarded a \$1,500 "Jumpstart Grant" from the Arizona Preservation Foundation to match with CHS funds and labor for restoration work at the Old Cornville Post Office. Repainting of the wood siding to refresh the exterior, solar lighting, and exhibit improvements are planned, along with a special event to mark the ten-year anniversary of the restoration and dedication of the historic structure.



The Society's Annual Fundraiser was held at the Apache Maid Ranch Lower Ranch Headquarters on December 3, 2023. The event featured *"Ranching on the Apache Maid"* by Don Godard, a well-known Cornvillian with a wealth of knowledge about the Ranch's history.

The Ranch was established in the 1880's and has long been one of the biggest ranches in northern Arizona, with regular camping spots for seasonal cattle drives. The Apache Maid operation spans over fifty miles eastward from Cornville to its Upper Ranch headquarters beyond



its namesake Apache Maid Mountain.

The program was followed by the Society's popular raffle of gift baskets featuring gift certificates and

themed items. The outdoor event drew a sold-out crowd of 120 and raised \$2,040 to help sustain the Society! Thank you everyone for your support!

MEMORIAL: Fred Anderson

Born in Oregon December 5, 1930, Fred moved to Prescott as a small child and then to Cornville where he started school. He graduated from Clemenceau High School. He joined the Air Force during the Korean War and was stationed in Germany where he met his wife Anna, who preceded him in death after 65 years of marriage. Fred worked at the Cement Plant for 40 years. He is survived by daughters Sylvia Ray and Helen Behlow, four grandsons and eleven great grandkids. He was a charter member and supporter of the Cornville Historical Society. Fred passed away December 15, 2023.; a memorial service was held at Prescott National Cemetery.


BABY BOOMERS ARE NOW OLD TIMERS!



After the Cornville Historical Society was established in 2005, the Board of Directors developed an informal reference "List of Old Timers", those folks who were born and/or raised in Cornville and that were still residents at the time. The Society reached out to many of them and gathered their stories for its oral history collection; and they also established a membership category that allows anyone who has lived in Cornville for fifty years or more to be an Honorary Member if they choose. In 2015 our "old-timer" list (mostly "pre-boomer" folks) had over 30 names. Now, there are about a dozen left. It has become apparent that more outreach is needed to find today's Cornville old-timers! So, the search is on!

The Society is updating its List of Oldtimers to include anyone born in the Cornville area or nearby before 1964 and that has lived here fifty years or more. The Baby Boomer Era extended from 1946 to 1964, so those babies are now anywhere from 60 to 78 years old.

The Cornville Historical Society would like to hear from anyone who fits in that time frame. We'd like to know your stories and invite you to participate in our programs to gather, and share Cornville's history. If so desired, we would welcome you as new "honorary members", as well! Benefits consist of receiving a newsletter from the Society, opportunity to attend special events, and to contribute to the growing knowledge of local history.
